RABBI'S COLUMN

Longing for What Could Be

"Summertime, and the livin' is easy..."

DuBose Heyward, the composer of the song, "Summertime," forever implanted within the American psyche (with the help of Gershwin's musical composition for his poem featured prominently within the musical, "Porgy and Bess") the idea that Summertime is the time for living without a care in one's life. In a sense, Summer does have this carefree allure, given that, for most people, our list of obligations tends to wane with the conclusion of the school year and the arrival of long days that make outdoor activity so welcoming. This is, however, just the outwardly nostalgic image of Summertime.

Summer is also the setting for many of the worst of human experiences as it is the season of warfare, both of the kind that our ancestors often suffered throughout history and the threat of which we now find our brothers and sisters in Israel facing. Jews, however, are reminded regularly of the fact that there is no place for us to hide from those who would wish to confine us or to harm us; recent events in Paris and elsewhere have reminded us of this lesson. It is in this year's month of August that we remember, on the ninth of the Jewish month of Av, the destruction of the Holy Temples in Jerusalem, the symbol of our Jewish religious civilization and independence. While I am certain that the vast majority of Jews do not wish for the return of the Holy Temples and the sacrifices that were once held within it, we certainly desire to maintain our unique religious expression within our rich heritage.

And therein lies the question: When we reminisce about days gone by, of how things used to be in our lives, and how we must "get back to basics," we are usually longing not for what was but rather for what could have been. In our far-too-complicated, post-modern, digitally connected lives, most of us feel a longing for silence, for simplicity, for clarity. Even more so, this is true as we age; we look back at our youth longingly and lovingly, as only beings who can forget the worst and remember the best can do. As your Rabbi and pastoral counselor, as one who listens to the histories of your hearts, I can tell you that both the worst and the best of the past is gone, that letting go of our vision of what we believe could have been (not was) will go a long way to allowing us to make the best of the future before us.

You know, when I speak with people who are just beginning their family trees, there is often this same "soft focus" view of our ancestors' lives and the world in which they lived that is driven by this same longing to rediscover a more perfect time. Most people, much to my surprise, are looking to reconnect with long-lost family and assume that they lived in a world in which everyone was wonderful, wealthy, attractive, and without worry. Even in my own family, I have discovered the hard reality that all sorts of illnesses and challenges also plagued our ancestors' lives just as they do each of our families today.

Nearly every person who begins any kind of journey of reflection must battle with this inner drive to see what was as a slice of perfection. Lovingly seeing the past for what it was is probably the only way to allow us to develop an understanding of how to live healthily in our world today. More simply stated: Achieving the greatest spiritual vision requires equally honest reflection.

May each of us find our true selves by meaningfully and lovingly seeing the world as it has been so that we might make the healthiest and most "picturesque" future come true for ourselves and everyone around us.

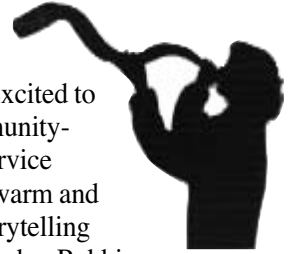

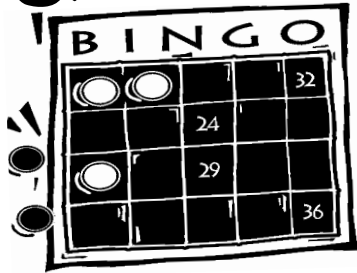
Jewish Community Selichot Program & Services

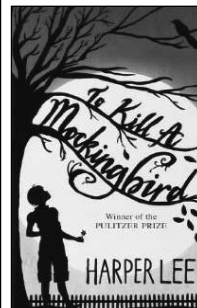

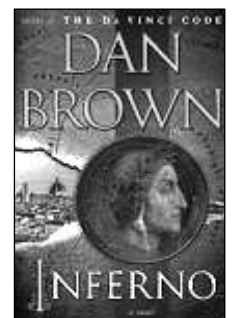

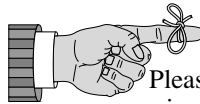
