

#### RABBI'S COLUMN

November 1st marks the beginning of the month of Cheshvan. There are many different names for this month in our texts and traditions. We're probably most familiar with the name the Talmud gives this month, Marcheshvan. Mar Cheshvan, or "Bitter" Cheshvan,



emphasizes the lack of holidays and causes for celebration.

The Book of Kings refers to this month as the month of Bul (bet-vay-lamed). The Hebrew word for flood, mabul (mem-betvav-lamed), comes from this same root. The Talmud (Rosh Hashanah 11b:6-7) teaches that the great flood in the story of Noah occurred during this month. Genesis 7:11 reads "In the six hundredth year of Noah's life, in the second month, on the seventeenth day of the month, on that day, all the fountains of the great deep burst apart, and the floodgates of the sky broke open." According to Rabbi Eliezer, this was the 17th of Marcheshvan.

Water is a powerful metaphor for God. It can both sustain and destroy life, from a gentle rain to a torrent. After Sukkot we begin to pray for rain in our Amidah. We name God as "the one who causes wind to blow and rain to fall - mashiv haruach u'morid ha-gashem." We need the rain, but we recognize that the rain can be overpowering. It depends on the context and our perspective.

Spending the High Holidays together, seeing the sanctuary filled to the brim with people and ruach, filled up my spiritual cup. Kosi r'vaya, my cup is overflowing. This is the metaphor of water that resonates for me as we approach Cheshvan. The energy and connection that we built during this High Holiday season can be its own kind of flood. May the flood waters of Chesvan be gentle and nourishing, and may they carry us into a new rhythm together. Chodesh tov!

## President's Message

For those of you who asked to see a copy of my Rosh Hashanah remarks and for those of you who were not able to join us for the first day of Rosh Hashanah, here you go!

A couple of weeks ago, a man named Roy Sutton contacted me. He had purchased a book at a used bookstore in Milleville called, "Southern New

Jersey Synagogues: A Social History from 1880-1980." He asked if we'd like a copy of it for the Temple and of course, I said, YES! It's fascinating and contains stories of about 20 South Shore synagogues, kosher hotels, holocaust survivors who live in S. Jersey, the Woodbine Jews, the chicken farms... and there's a chapter about Temple Beth Shalom. Betty Chaikin is quoted throughout this chapter. I'd like to read just a small section of "our" chapter to you.

Today, the average age of this congregation is 60 years old. The synagogue wants to attract younger people for its future because you have to pass the responsibility of perpetuation onto the next generation. The synagogue is at a crossroads at this time.

What is the future of this community as a Jewish one? What would happen if Beth Shalom would have to close its doors? How would this affect the community? There is a nucleus of 25 people in this Jewish community, but they are all over the age of 60 today. They are not optimistic about the future of the synagogue. "Bring in a part time rabbi to help," said some. But the congregation is against such a move.

The congregation came to be for one generation of Jews on the Brigantine Island. The Jews of Brigantine created a synagogue from telephone numbers in a telephone directory with names that sounded Jewish! No Sabbath services are held on Saturday, only Friday night services and High Holiday services are conducted in this synagogue.

Well – we're still here! Our congregants are well over 60 now and we DO have a part time Rabbi "to help!" As we begin this New Year, 5785, let's just sit back and revel in this moment with pride in our hearts that we have kept our Founding Fathers' and Mothers' dream alive. There IS a Jewish presence on this island. We've celebrated our synagogue, our Judaism and each other for more than 50 years in this building! Our founders, with unwavering determination, set forth on a mission to establish and maintain a Jewish presence on the island of Brigantine. Their vision was to ensure that Judaism would always belong here, regardless of the challenges and changes that time would bring. Today, we're here as a testament to their legacy. Their dedication to maintaining our Jewish heritage on this island paved the way for generations of individuals and families to find solace, community, and spirituality within these walls. In honoring our founders' vision, we continued to build upon the foundations they laid, ensuring that Temple Beth Shalom remains a beacon of Jewish identity and unity. Our new door, lovingly created and painted by artist, Ron Ross Cohen beckons us to enter, to stay and to let the

Brigantine community know that we are still here!

I am filled with gratitude for our hardworking board: Camille, Jack, Jack, Bernie, Sheila, Judy, Gloria, Lena, Neil, Gene, Richard, Shirley, Harry, and now Rabbi Steph. Your accomplishments have not gone unnoticed. The countless hours you've dedicated to planning, organizing, and executing events and initiatives have enriched the lives of our members and

strengthened the bonds of our congregation in this community.

To Steve, my husband, you are always there to write an article, give an adult ed presentation, speak on behalf of Temple Beth Shalom, lead a service, pass out napkins and talk me through some challenging moments. Thank you!

I'm also filled with gratitude for you, our members. You have made a commitment to support Temple Beth Shalom even when you belong to a congregation "at home." I encourage each and every one of you to explore the opportunities available to you in this congregation. PLEASE, share your talents with us and connect with your fellow congregants.

This year, we have TWO amazing women leading us in prayer! Rabbi Stephanie Breitsman joined Temple Beth Shalom on July 1st and we couldn't be happier that she chose US to be her congregation. We welcome back to our bimah for the 2nd year, Cantor Gail Foorman, and her husband, Craig, from Atlanta, GA. Rabbi Steph and Cantor Foorman have been working tirelessly to make our Holiday services meaningful and spiritual for our congregation. Cantor Gail, thank you for leading us again in music this holiday season and thank you for working with our new Temple Choir, *Shirat Shalom*, organized by Lorna Rosenberg! 



## How to be more vigilant

See something, say something!

The FBI just reported that the Jewish community is the most targeted religious group in the United States for hate crimes. Jews are just 2% of the population but account for 67% of all religiously motivated hate crimes.

These include the 1,005 bomb threats and swatting incidents in the last year logged by the Secure Community Network (SCN), the official security organization of the North American Jewish community – incidents that can force evacuations as people are abruptly pushed out of their facilities.

Religious services, school days, and other events are interrupted, causing fear and sometimes trauma for those who engage in Jewish life. People go to synagogues to pray. They should not have to flee.

Other incidents include events where protesters proudly support the terror group Hamas and their terroristic actions. Individuals are frequently seen promoting and advocating for the slaughter and genocide of Jews with pro-Hamas flags, slogans, and vandalizing buildings, sidewalks, and other public spaces.

The Justice Department has brought charges, obtained plea agreements, and secured sentences for over 30 criminal acts motivated by antisemitic hate in just the past few months. SCN has worked with authorities on many of these cases.

ALL OF THIS is happening within our country and being stoked, in some cases, by outside influences. Iran is fomenting some of these violent groups and has been actively involved in financing anti-Israel protests. In so doing, Iran and Hamas have found their way into our cities and towns and systematically infiltrated our institutions. They are actively influencing and working to undermine American life.

It's time for Americans to wake up and face these threats before a mass attack takes place.

Yahya Sinwar, Architect Of The Oct. 7 Terror Attacks On Israel, Confirmed Killed

(Israel) Yahya Sinwar, the elusive Hamas leader widely credited with masterminding the Oct. 7 terror attacks on Israel, was confirmed dead recently, ending a yearlong manhunt for the militant chief. He was 61. The Israel Defense Forces said Sinwar was killed by soldiers in an operation in southern Gaza on Wednesday. Sinwar who was born in a refugee camp and spent years in an Israeli prison before rising to the top of the Iran-backed militant group, was described as a "dead man walking" by the Israeli military in the days after the Oct. 7 attacks. But he managed to evade capture for over a year. The only sighting of him before his death was in grainy footage taken on Oct. 10, 2023, three days after Hamas' assault, according to the Israeli military. It showed him fleeing with his family into a tunnel, one of a large network build by Hamas under Gaza, which the militant group used to smuggle weapons, hide out from Israeli attacks and keep Israeli hostages captive.

## **Our New Front Door**

In 2022, we applied for a FEMA grant, and we were rewarded \$39,000. With part of this money, we removed the existing front doors of the Temple and replaced them with 18-gauge galvanized steel doors for our main entrance. Our new steel doors gave us a sense of security, but they weren't very beautiful, quite institutional, actually. We had them painted burgundy, but hoped to commission an artist to create a beautiful front entrance to the synagogue letting all visitors and congregants know that we are still here and plan to be here for a long time!

Rabbi Fox spoke with past congregant, Vera Getz. She had purchased the original doors to the synagogue. He asked her if she might be interested in funding the beautification of the front door. She agreed that we could commission an artist to do this work and she would fund the project. With blessings from the Temple board, we contacted past congregant, Stephanie Segal Miller, also an artist, to see if she could recommend someone to create a beautiful front entrance for the synagogue. She recommended Galloway artist, Ron Ross Cohen.

In October of 2023 we began discussions with Ron. Ron was inspired by our podiums and by our name, the shul by the sea. After weeks of research and designs, his first design just wouldn't work. It would make the doors too heavy and was too costly for our benefactor. Ron took his original design and turned it into a mural in two sections that he could create in his studio and then hang on our doors (like wallpaper). He added several three-dimensional aspects to the design and a Star of David created from wood.

Ron installed the mural on the door right before Rosh Hashanah. The door is stunning. Everyone who has seen it remarks on its beauty. If you come in the early afternoon, the sun shines directly on it making the design come alive. The beams coming out from the Star of David literally pop out at you! The waves seem to glisten and move. Although it's just been added to our building, it feels as though it's always been there.

We were blessed to find Ron Ross Cohen and are thankful to Vera Getz and Stephanie Segal Miller for bringing him to us. It felt as though we were meant to find each other, it was bashert. Ron put his heart and soul into creating our front door. He experienced a heightened spiritual connection to his own Judaism while creating the door for us, and he hopes it will help spread Judaism's spirit and goodwill from Temple Beth Shalom to our community.


